January through September only. **This is for occasional tree trimming only.** The chipper remains in one location for no more than 15 minutes. Nothing more than 4" in diameter will be accepted. Please place all cut ends laying in the same direction at the curb. If you hire a contractor to trim your trees, you must arrange for that contractor to dispose of the brush. It will not be picked up by the Borough.

## ACCEPTED MATERIALS

**Please Note: Accepted plastics have changed**



- **Newspaper** - Newspaper and newspaper inserts are accepted as well as magazines.
- **Paper** - Copier, typing, mimeo, note and stationary paper that is non-glossy and free of plastic (no window envelopes).
- **Corrugated Cardboard and Paperboard** - Paperboard is gray or white non-corrugated cardboard, such as cereal and shoe boxes. Remove any plastic bag liners or cellophane windows. Cardboard and paperboard with wax or plastic coating such as milk cartons and ice cream containers are not accepted.
- **Glass** - Jars and bottles should be rinsed and caps removed. Colorless glass, green glass, and brown glass should be separated and placed in the designated containers. NO ceramics, plate glass, headlights, dishes, light bulbs, or Pyrex, please.
- **Plastic** - All plastics labeled #1 and #2.
- **Cans** - Aluminum beverage cans and bi-metal/steel cans.

## DO NOT RECYCLE THESE ITEMS:



- Styrofoam packaging, cups and trays
- Microwavable plastics
- Disposable party cups
- Plastic bags
- Household appliances, toys, CD cases, plastic hangers
- Broken glass bottles or jars
- Drinking glasses, plates, dishes, mugs, cookware, etc.
- Window & mirror glass
- Light bulbs
- Paper towels, tissues, napkins, plates, etc.
- Construction paper & dark colored paper
- Paper take-out food containers, plastic tableware
- Potato chip & snack food bags
- Plastic coated paper such as pet food bags
- Metal coat hangers, cutlery, pots/pans, screws, nails, etc.
- Propane cylinders

# Grilling Safety

There's nothing like outdoor grilling. It's one of the most popular ways to cook food. But, a grill placed too close to anything that can burn is a fire hazard. They can be very hot, causing burn injuries. Follow these simple tips and you will be on the way to safe grilling.

## SAFETY TIPS

- » Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- » The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- » Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- » Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- » Never leave your grill unattended.
- » Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

## CHARCOAL GRILLS

- » There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- » If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- » Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- » There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- » When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.


## PROPANE Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. **If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department.** Do not move the grill.

If the flame **goes out**, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least **5 minutes** before re-lighting it.

## FACTS

- ❗ July is the peak month for grill fires.
- ❗ Roughly half of the injuries involving grills are thermal burns.

# PROPERTY TAX RELIEF PROGRAMS

Please be advised the following tax relief programs are available to qualified residents of the State of New Jersey. You may stop in to pick up an application.

## Property Tax Relief Programs

To All Township Residents Ages 65 and older, Disabled Persons, and Veterans:

**\$250 Senior/Disabled Deduction** – If you qualify, this program allows the Tax Collector to deduct \$250 from your total taxes. That is, you pay \$250 less than the total billed amount of your taxes. There is an income requirement-NOT INCLUDING SOCIAL SECURITY YOUR HOUSEHOLD INCOME MUST BE LESS THAN \$10,000 COMBINED.

**\$250 Veteran Deduction** – If you or your spouse are/were a veteran, you may qualify for a \$250 deduction on your taxes.

**100% Disabled Veteran Exemption** – If you or your spouse are/were a 100% disabled veteran, you may qualify for an exemption on your taxes.

**The Property Tax Reimbursement Program** – If you qualify, this program sets a base rate for your taxes. That amount is set based on the year you apply and the State reimburses you any increase in your taxes from your base year. Although it is commonly called the “Senior Freeze Program”, this program does not freeze the taxes. All taxes must be paid as billed and the following year the State of New Jersey will refund any tax increase to you through an application process. Once a resident is enrolled in the program, the State of New Jersey will automatically send the application every year. The application is commonly referred to as the “Blue Booklet”. First time applicants may get an application at the Tax Office, the Office on Aging, or the State of New Jersey (1-800-882-6597). Please note: For those persons already enrolled in the program, remember to have the taxes paid verification form filled out by the Tax Collector's Office and sent along with the application.

**The Homestead Rebate/Benefit** – This program is administered by the State of New Jersey. The State of New Jersey automatically sends qualified applicants an application in the mail. For more information regarding this program, you may call the State of New Jersey at 1-888-238-1233.

**Reminder:** The Homestead Rebate and Property Tax Reimbursement Programs are separate programs and separate applications must be filed every year for each program. Benefits available under these programs may be affected by State budgetary constraints.

# QUALITY ON TAP REPORT - 2019 ANNUAL DRINKING WATER QUALITY REPORT

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.



In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

The Safe Drinking Water Act regulations allow monitoring waivers to reduce or eliminate the monitoring requirements for asbestos, volatile organic chemicals and synthetic organic chemicals. Our system received a monitoring waiver for synthetic organic chemicals (primarily pesticides and herbicides).

**CONTAMINANTS THAT MAY BE PRESENT IN SOURCE WATER INCLUDE:**

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are byproducts of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can, also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

## SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS REGARDING CHILDREN, PREGNANT WOMEN, NURSING MOTHERS, AND OTHERS:

Children may receive a slightly higher amount of a contaminant present in the water than do adults, on a body weight basis, because they may drink a greater amount of water per pound of body weight than do adults. For this reason, reproductive or developmental effects are used for calculating drinking water standard if these effects occur at lower levels than other health effects of concern. If there is insufficient toxicity information for a chemical (for example, lack of data on reproductive or developmental effects), an extra uncertainty factor may be incorporated into the calculation of the drinking water standard, thus making the standard more stringent, to account for additional uncertainties regarding these effects. In the cases of lead and nitrate, effects on infants and children are the health endpoints upon which the standards are based.

- Take shorter showers
- Only do full loads of wash
- Run dishwasher when fully loaded

To ensure the continued quality of our water we treat it in several ways. We add a proprietary blend of polyphosphates, orthophosphate, and inorganic phosphate compound to sequester Iron, Manganese, and Calcium. It also controls mineral precipitation and provides additional corrosion control benefits for unlined cast iron pipes. We also add small amounts of chlorine to kill any bacteria or tiny organisms that may be in the water.

We at the Woodstown Water Department work hard to provide quality water to every tap. We ask that all our customers help us protect our water sources, which are the heart of our community, our way of life and our children's future.

# Quality on Tap Report



## 2018 ANNUAL DRINKING WATER QUALITY REPORT

We are pleased to present to you this year's Annual Drinking Water Quality Report. This report is designed to inform you about the quality water and services we deliver to you every day. Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make to continually improve the water treatment process and protect our water resources.

We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water. Our water sources are ground water wells. Our wells draw groundwater from the Mt. Laurel-Wenonah and Potomac-Raritan-Magothy (PRM) Aquifers.

### Safe Drinking Water Hotline

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbiological contaminants are available from the **Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791)**.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The Borough of Woodstown is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. ### DEFINITIONS

In the following table you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

**PARTS PER MILLION (PPM) OR MILLIGRAMS PER LITER (MG/L)** - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

**PARTS PER BILLION (PPB) OR MICROGRAMS PER LITER** - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

**PICOCURIES PER LITER (PCI/L)** - picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.

**ACTION LEVEL** - the concentration of a contaminant, which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements, which a water system must follow.

**MAXIMUM CONTAMINANT LEVEL** - The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

**MAXIMUM CONTAMINANT LEVEL GOAL** -The "Goal"(MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

**MAXIMUM RESIDUAL DISINFECTANT LEVEL (MRDL)**: The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

**MAXIMUM RESIDUAL DISINFECTANT GOAL (MRDLG)**: The level of a drinking water disinfectant, below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contamination

**SECONDARY CONTAMINANT**- Substances that do not have an impact on health. Secondary Contaminants affect aesthetic qualities such as odor, taste or appearance. Secondary standards are recommendations, not mandates.

**RECOMMENDED UPPER LIMIT (RUL)** - Recommended maximum concentration of secondary contaminants. These reflect aesthetic qualities such as odor, taste or appearance. RUL's are recommendations, not mandates.

# The Woodstown Borough Water Department Results From The Year 2017

## WATER QUALITY TEST RESULTS

The Woodstown Water Department routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. The table below shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1 to December 31, 2018

The state allows us to monitor for some contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently. Some of our data, though representative, are more than one year old.

EPA requires monitoring for over 80 drinking water contaminants. Those contaminants listed in the table below are the only contaminants detected in your water.

### SUSCEPTIBILITY RATING FOR WOODSTOWN BOROUGH WATER DEPARTMENT SOURCES

The table below illustrates the susceptibility rating for the seven-contaminant categories (and radon) for each source in the system. The table provides the number of wells and intakes that rated high (H), medium (M), or low (L) for each contaminant category. For susceptibility ratings of purchased water, refer to specific water system's source water assessment report.

The seven-contaminant categories are defined at the bottom of this page. DEP considered all surface water highly susceptible to pathogens; therefore all intake received a high rating for the pathogen category. For the purpose of Source Water Assessment Program, radionuclides were not determined and they all received a low rating.

**If a system is rated highly susceptible for a contaminant, it does not mean a customer is or will be consuming contaminated drinking water.** The rating reflects the potential for contamination of source water, not the existence of contamination. Public water systems are required to monitor for regulated contaminants and to install treatment if any contaminants are detected at frequencies and concentrations above allowable levels. As a result of the assessments, DEP may customize (change existing) monitoring schedules based on susceptibility ratings.

**PATHOGENS** - Disease-causing organisms such as bacteria and viruses. Common sources are animal and human fecal wastes.

**NUTRIENTS** - Compounds, minerals, and elements that aid growth, that are both naturally occurring and man-made. Examples include nitrogen and phosphorus.

**VOLATILE ORGANIC COMPOUNDS** - Man-made chemicals used as solvents, degreasers, and gasoline components. Examples include benzene, methyl tertiary butyl ether (MTBE), and vinyl chloride.

**PESTICIDES** - Man-made chemicals used to control pests, weeds, and fungus. Common sources include land application and manufacturing centers of pesticides. Examples include herbicides such as atrazine, and insecticides such as chlordane.

**INORGANICS** - Mineral-based compounds that are both naturally occurring and man-made. Examples include arsenic, asbestos, copper, lead, and nitrate.

**RADIONUCLIDES** - Radioactive substances that are both naturally occurring and man-made. Examples include radium and uranium.

**DISINFECTION BY-PRODUCT PRECURSORS** - A common source is naturally occurring organic matter in surface water. Disinfection byproducts are formed when the disinfectants (usually chlorine) used to kill pathogens react with dissolved organic material (for example leaves) present in surface water.

# Solutions to Stormwater Pollution

## Easy Things You Can Do Every Day to Protect Our Water

### **A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water**

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, and grass clippings: you name it and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.

As a resident, business, or another member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

#### **Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides**

- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- Look into alternatives for pesticides.
- Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer.
- If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it. Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.

#### **Properly use and dispose of hazardous products**

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze and paints.
- Do not pour any hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.
- Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.
- Recycle used motor oil.
- Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous waste disposal facilities.

#### **Keep pollution out of storm drains**

- Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local waterbodies.
- Do not let sewage or other wastes flow into stormwater system.

#### **Clean up after your pet**

- Many Municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet waste rules.
- An example is requiring pet owners for their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.
- Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law.

And remember to:

- Use newspaper, bags or pooper scoopers to pick up wastes.
- Dispose of wrapped pet waste in the trash or un-wrapped in a toilet.
- Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.

#### **Don't feed wildlife**

- Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.
- Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.

#### **Don't litter**

- Place litter in trash receptacles.
- Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.
- Participate in community cleanups.

#### **Dispose of yard waste properly**

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.
- If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them.
- Use leaves and grass clippings as resource for compost.
- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.

The Construction and Inspection Office provides inspection and enforcement of all Construction Codes relating to construction, maintenance, use and occupancy of buildings.

A Building Permit is required for

- Renovations
- Repairs
- Additions
- Roof (commercial, not residential)
- Pool (aboveground or in ground)
- Lawn Sprinkler System
- Shed (requires a building permit if the square footage of the shed is 201 square feet and over; a shed of 200 square feet and less does NOT require a construction permit).
- Oil Tank Removal

### Construction Plans and Layout Drawings

A NJ Licensed Architect is recommended for the preparation of plans for major projects. Major projects may need to include floor plans drawn to scale, sections, elevations and details. Minor projects such as decks and small additions may be drawn by the homeowner. The Construction Office has standard specifications that can be followed within certain limitations for routine projects such as decks and retaining walls. These specs, along with a plot plan/survey depicting your project are accepted as the required plans. There are some plans that require a NJ Licensed Engineer to prepare plans. Examples are in-ground pools, grading plans and retaining walls more than four feet in height. Every application for a construction permit shall be accompanied by a set of plans showing the actual shape and dimensions of the lot to be built upon, the exact location, size and height of all existing and proposed structures, and all existing easements.

### Landlord Identity Registration form

If you own rental property in Woodstown Borough, New Jersey State law requires landlords who rent houses, apartments or buildings to register certain information with the Housing Official where the building is located. The landlord must display the required information at the property in a place where tenants can see it and the landlord must give this information in writing to each tenant. The Landlord Identity Registration Form is available at Borough Hall or on our website Historicwoodstown.org.

## Yard Sales

Woodstown allows each property to have two yard sales per year not including the Community Wide Yard Sale. We have our Community Wide Yard Sale the first Saturday in May, which no permit is needed. The second Saturday in May is Give Away Day for any items you wish to give away for free and no yard sales are permitted on this day. Besides those two days, if a resident wishes to have a yard sale they must come in to obtain a yard sale permit. There is a \$5.00 permit fee and a \$10.00 deposit on the signs that is refundable when the three signs are returned. These signs are the only signs permitted for advertising.

Place one sign in your front yard and the other two signs may be used as directional signs. Please obtain permission before placing any signs on private property.



## CLOTHING DONATIONS

The Borough now has a clothing drop off shed located behind Borough Hall. These donations go directly to people in need, instead of being turned into scraps. The Borough makes 8 cents per pound of these donations.



## DOG LICENSES

Dog Licenses are due for renewal by January 31 of each year. A valid rabies certificate that is good through November of the issuing year must be presented. The cost for a spayed/neutered dog is \$21.00 and for a non-spayed or neutered dog it is \$24.00. After March 15, there will be an additional \$10.00 late fee.

***If the license is not renewed by the time the annual dog census begins in the summer, there will be a \$50.00 late fee.***

## SUMMER UPDATE:

# INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENTS IN WOODSTOWN

On the Borough website is a letter from Mayor Don Dietrich that was mailed out to all residents and businesses this past March. It describes construction that is underway on East and West Avenue and North Main Street which will continue until November 2019. Additional improvements are also coming:



- 1) As part of the 2019 improvements of North Main, NJDOT will add storm water catch basins on the east side of North Main from the intersection north to Bowen Avenue to fix the “standing water problem” that occurs after every rain storm.
- 2) NJDOT has agreed to our request to lower the speed limit from Richman west to the RR tracks from 35 MPH to 30 MPH. The new 30 MPH zone will now extend all the way from Richman west to Green Street.
- 3) Using our Safe Routes to School grant we will be able to complete sidewalks on north side of Bailey from Lotus to Hillcrest Drive, along Alloway Road from Liberty to Bailey, and along Old Salem Road from Liberty to Bailey. We will also add crosswalk and flashing cross walk signs in front of Shoemaker school on East Millbrooke and the corner of Bailey/Lotus.
- 6) Woodstown has received a state grant to repave Spring Garden and Liberty Ave and will do so in the fall of 2019. We will be replacing the water mains under those streets at the same time. We have also received a state grant to repave Colson Court and will be doing so in 2020.

Please note that 43 new downtown street trees will be planted in the autumn of 2019 by NJDOT (at no cost to Woodstown) to replace the 21 old ones that were removed by NJDOT in May before curb improvements started.

## MESSAGE FROM THE

# CHIEF MUNICIPAL FINANCIAL OFFICER



The 2019 Municipal Budget has been approved by the New Jersey Division of Local Government Services. After a public hearing was held, as required, the budget was adopted by Borough Council on April 23, 2019.

The 2019 budget includes a 2.8 cent increase in the local tax purpose rate. \$2,016,278.00 is raised by the local tax rate of 72.5 cents per \$100.00 of assessed valuation in support of the municipal budget. The total municipal budget for 2019 is \$3,694,996.04 which is a reduction of \$477,806.59 from 2018.

The 2019 Water Utility budget is \$1,005,000.000 which is an increase over 2018 of \$59,760.00 and is paid through consumer utility billing.

The 2019 Open Space budget is \$41,742.00. The open space tax rate as increased from 1 cent (2018) to 1 ½ cent (2019) per \$100.00 of assessed valuation.
